
60/2018, Positioning First Nations as Climate Leaders

Joint Committee on Climate Action (JCCA)

- Established in 2016 by a Process Document and Joint Statement from the National Chief and Prime Minister.
- Composed of First Nations technical representatives (10 regions) and Federal Officials.
- Met 6 times, most recently in Edmonton.
- Unique opportunity to present an annual report directly to the Prime Minister and the National Chief

 - Elder Albert Marshall presented the concept of Two-Eyed Seeing, and
 - Elder Reg Crowshoe presented the concept of Ethical Space.
- Federal funding accessibility (Funding Placemat and Best Practices Guide).
- Greenhouse Gas Pollution Pricing Act (GHGPP).
- First Nations Climate Hub.

Building Relationships:

Advancing reconciliation and climate action through increased communication, cooperation, and transparency.



Advancing the PCF:

Ensure First Nations are full and effective partners in advancing clean growth and addressing climate change.

First Nations' Leadership:

Joint development of approaches that support First Nations as leaders on climate action.

Annual Report

- Renewing Our Relationship on Climate Action:
 - Highlighting the urgency to act on the climate crisis; reconciliation; weaving knowledge systems.
- Advancing Joint Climate Action:
 - Redesigning certain federal climate-related programs; better communications tools; greenhouse gas pollution pricing.
- Our Path Forward:
 - Building on current climate actions to outline activities the JCCA will pursue to advance Canada's climate plan.

Looking Ahead

- First Nations experience problems accessing climate-related funding sources, including the GHGPPA:
 - Program changes are helpful but not systemic enough to solve this issue.
- Increase the resiliency of First Nations in the face of a changing climate:
 - First Nations often experience disproportionate impacts of climate change.
- Explore new funding mechanism(s) that would allow First Nations to selfdetermine how they:
 - Adapt to and mitigate the impacts climate change, and Develop and implement their own plans in response to climate change.
